"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven."

So begins the 3rd chapter of the Old Testament Book of Ecclesiastes. The musical group, the Byrds, took this text in the 1960s and fashioned it into the song "Turn Turn Turn" which was an instant hit. The rest of this 3rd chapter describes all the times in our lives – a time to be born, a time to die; a time to weep and a time to laugh; a time to mourn and a time to dance; and so on. So often I recommend this text for people at transitions – at happy times and at sad times.

Right now at St. Peter's we are at one of those times of transition – a sad time and a happy time.

In the spring of 2004, Addie Carrara came to be Parish Secretary at St. Peter's. She began her work with the then Rector, Father Richard Signore. After Father Richard left, she served with 2 Interim Priests, a great variety of supply clergy, and with me. She has helped those in need, giving them food from our Food Pantry or directing them to other community resources.

THE DEACON'S CORNER

To the Saints of St. Peter's Church On-The-Canal in Buzzards Bay, greetings from your traveling Deacon!

It is good to be back among you after 10 days on the Spanish island of Mallorca, in the Mediterranean Sea. Mallorca is in the Spanish province of Catalonia and the people, Catalans, speak a dialect that is distinct from the rest of Spain.

Mallorca is a land of rugged mountains as well as gorgeous bays and beaches. Much of the interior, where we stayed, is rolling fields where farmers raise sheep and horses, struggle to coax a crop of grain from the dry, rocky ground, and of course, tend groves of olive trees.

We were told that the olive groves contained trees over 800 years old. It wasn't hard to believe because some of the trunks were at least 8 feet in diameter and unbelievably gnarled and twisted. In some cases the original trunk was hollowed out and to all appearances dead, but then new shoots were blossoming out of that same trunk.

These new shoots will eventually wind themselves around the old trunk. I was told that the trees must be pruned back regularly and vigorously or they will die. This brought to mind a recent Gospel reading about how the Lord prunes us to remove the dead branches so that we might bear even more fruit. What would appear to be drastic pruning is absolutely essential to the health of the olive tree. So it is with us. Periodically we need to let go of our old negative attitudes, anger and grudges in order to be more spiritually and emotionally healthy and open to the Holy Spirit's guidance.

We stayed in a large stone house on a country estate, not unlike those the Romans might have built there 2000+ years ago. It wasn't hard to pick out the foundations of buildings in the countryside that had long ago disintegrated into heaps of dust and the stones of which they were built. The thought crossed my mind that Mallorca may have been one of the places St. Paul intended to visit when he was planning a missionary journey to Roman Iberia (Spain), a visit he never got to make. He was called to Rome instead.

The Cathedral in Palma de Mallorca is magnificent! It sits atop the former citadel of the Roman city (there are those pesky Romans again!), between the Royal Palace and the Bishop's Residence. King James I of Aragon began building it in 1229 on the site of a Muslim Mosque. The Cathedral, one of the largest in Europe, wasn't finished until 1601. It is 121 meters long, 55 meters wide and its nave is 44 meters tall. The sheer size of the place doesn't really penetrate until you stand in the central nave and look up at the paintings on the vaulted ceiling 136 feet over your head. The huge Rose Windows (5 of them) and many stained glass windows are breathtakingly beautiful. There are many chapels on either side of the central nave, including one Royal Chapel.

The reredos in the chapels (some of them gold) are priceless works of art. It is said that several hundred years ago a Pope coveted the most beautiful of them and offered to replace it with a "silver" replica. The Bishop of Mallorca declined the honor. I can imagine him telling the Holy Father: "*Look, I was born at night, but not last night!*"

It was a much-needed time of rest and recuperation for me. To describe all that we saw and did would consume pages. In the process we managed to let the Mediterranean sun bake the cold of a long New England winter out of our bones. My attitude has been re-adjusted and I return rejuvenated from my recent misadventures in the hospital. Travel is a good thing, but it is even better to come home again, don't you think?

The Vestry had their May meeting on Monday, May 18, 2015.

- 1) The Vestry continues to discuss what goals to work on for 2015. Three goals have been proposed:
 - a) Eight parishioners signed up at the Annual Meeting to work on an Archive Committee.
 - b) A review of Friendly Kitchen has already begun, facilitated by Mark Taylor and Lynne Brune.
 - c) Establish a committee to review ways that the congregation can serve St. Peter's internally, as well as opportunities of outreach to our community. We also need to revise our current brochure and find ways to inform visitors and our community about what our church has to offer, by means of using public media, such as local cable television, Council on Aging, or newspaper advertising. A decision regarding the best way to approach these goals will be determined at our next meeting.
- 2) Much discussion occurred at our meeting regarding renewal of the Discovery Pre-School lease contract. Our lease with Discovery is coming to an end, and fortunately, it appears that they are willing to continue their arrangement with us.
- 3) Priscilla Ellis has been in contact with a representative of the Sandwich Farmers Market and we are very excited to hear that we are eligible to rent a table to sell our jams/jellies/relish. The cost will be \$20 for each time that we set up during the season. The Farmers' Market is held every Tuesday. Patti Metcalf will be looking into the cost of having some professional signs made that we can use for our Jelly Sales, and for our fall and Holiday Fairs.
- 4) Our yard looks great, thanks to our volunteers who spent a Saturday morning weeding, picking up trash, pruning and trimming and blowing sand from our parking lot! Thank you to Henri and Linda Masson, Patti, Mike and Joseph Metcalf, Kathy Letzeisen, Emily Johnson, John and Karen McGuinness, Mark Taylor, Charlie Ellis, and George Darling. We also want to thank Marcia Willmott, Elizabeth Gary and Barbara Cain for their work on Sallie Garden. Again, many hands made for quicker work, and we finished our labors within 3 hours. Amazing team work! John McGuinness has also offered to look into picking up some free black mulch to pretty-up our bushes and flowers.

- 5) It is with a thankful and sad heart that we say goodbye to Addie Carrara who will be retiring from our church secretary position in June. Addie has been in that position since 2004, and we want to thank her for all her service to St. Peter's. (See Reverend Sue's article.) There will be an Open House for Addie on **Friday, June 12, from 1 to 4 p.m.** Please stop by and express your thanks and good wishes to Addie as she begins her retirement. Goodies and coffee will be available in Stevenson Hall during the Open House.
- 6) It is time to make plans for our Annual Audit, and Reverend Sue is beginning to research some possible leads of who will be hired to conduct that audit.
- 7) Deacon Bob is back from Spain and looking rested from his earlier surgery and ready to pick up his Deacon duties again. We are happy to have him back. He will continue his work with the Massachusetts Maritime Cadets and will plan a Reflection Day for early fall.
