FROM THE RECTOR The Reverend Sue Lederhouse

Resurrection – new life – rebirth. All words we use to describe Easter and its impact on our lives. And this year we probably need to have new life in many ways.

This has been such a topsy-turvy season of Lent and months of February and March. Such changes in our weather from the warmth and almost summer like conditions of February to the horrendous and violent weather that we experienced in March with all its power losses and cancellations. And we began Lent on Ash Wednesday in an odd way. It was strange to have Ash Wednesday fall on Valentine's Day. A tough time for anyone who likes to celebrate that day with lots of chocolate!

We celebrate Easter on April 1 this year – April Fool's Day. And this is an interesting day to celebrate as well because to much of the world, what we celebrate on Easter is foolish. We celebrate a man who died on a cross, a man who was hanged in between 2 common criminals, a man who looked nothing like the king that the sign above His head proclaimed. And indeed WE ARE fools for Christ – fools who believe that out of that death did come new life and new birth. Fools who believe that Easter is not just about candy (once again) or Easter Dinner or Easter bonnets and Easter parades. It's not just about ducks or rabbits or Easter Egg Hunts, but about the miracle that happened on that first Easter Day.

And Easter is about the miracle that despite all the ways we turn away from God – all the ways that we hurt those around us and ourselves – all the ways that we may fail to live up to what God would have us do. . .despite all those things, God continues to love us. God loved us enough to send Jesus to live among us in His humanity, to teach us, and to die among us. And God continues to love us more than we can ever imagine.

That is the gift we are called to share with one another – that amazing miracle of Easter – that wondrous love of God. As we sing in Hymn 439 in our Hymnal:

What wondrous love is this, O my soul, O my soul! What wondrous love is this, O my soul! What wondrous love is this that caused the Lord of bliss to lay aside his crown for my soul, for my soul, to lay aside his crown for my soul.

VISIBLE VESTRY

Vestry met on Monday, March 19. 2018.

- 1. Thank You to our Substance Abuse Committee for a great job planning the Spaghetti Supper fundraiser for the Bourne Substance Abuse Coalition on March 9 which raised \$1000.00!!!! Thank You to the volunteers who worked in the kitchen and our servers, especially the students from Upper Cape Vocational Technical School. A thank you article has been written for the *Bourne Enterprise* for the wonderful donations from Olive Garden in Plymouth, Mezza Luna, and Honey Dew Donuts. The Committee is discussing their next possible educational program which is called "Hidden in Plain Sight". More information to come on this program.
- 2. Thank you to Caroline Stone's son, who teaches at the Blue Hills Vocational Technical School in Canton, and his students for the fabulous St. Peter's 80th birthday cake which we shared at Coffee Hour on March 11, Refreshment Sunday. Almost too pretty to eat and what a lot of work and detail that went into making it. Just wonderful!

- 3. We have new handicapped signs for our parking lot that will be put up soon. We are planning to have the parking spaces striped and are considering doing the entire parking lot, as it hasn't been done since 2010, and they are fading. Signs must be in place by June 1, in order for us to be in compliance with the timeline given to us by the Bourne Police Department.
- 4. We still need to get 12-inch street numbers for the front of our church building.
- 5. We have had some significant issues with our water pumps in the Discovery Day Care, resulting in flooding and the loss of some of their rugs. We have upgraded the primary pump to a more powerful and better pump to remove the ground water faster. A basement company has been contacted for an assessment and estimate to possibly seal the foundation to prevent future water leakage.
- 6. Three parishioners have attended the Eucharistic Visitor Training at St. David's and have received their certification. Another person will attend a training in April, and all will be commissioned soon.
- 7. The Lenten study, "Bible for Dummies," is going well with 20 plus folks registered.
- 8. An ad for Holy Week/Easter week services has been placed in the *Bourne Enterprise* and will run on March 23 and 30.
- 9. We will be hosting the Diocesan Altar Guild meeting on April 28, which will include a Eucharist and luncheon.
- 10. There will be two baptisms on April 29, and one baptism on May 20. All of these baptisms are at the 10:00 service.
- 11. The Vestry has been assigned the task of developing new goals for the 2018 church year. Areas of need that small groups worked on during the Vestry Retreat in February will be discussed and reviewed by the liaisons for each group. Goals in the following areas will be developed: Administration, Communications, Outreach, Parish Life, Pastoral Care, Building & Grounds, and Archives.
- 12. St. Peter's is still in need of volunteers to work as part of a Building and Grounds Committee. These folks would identify and assess, on an ongoing basis, any physical plant needs/repairs inside and outside the building. These identified needs or concerns will be brought to the Vestry for action. The Committee is **not required** to necessarily do any actual repairs, just stay on top of checking out the building and grounds.
- 13. Deacon Bob reported that the Men's breakfast had a brief meeting regarding the future location of the breakfast. Leo's does not have adequate room for the men to sit together, thus defeating the purpose of a time of fellowship. A majority voted to finish off this season at Leo's but in the fall they will return to the former location of Persy's in East Wareham on Cranberry Highway at 8:00 a.m.
- 14. Cape Light Compact will be returning soon to complete the replacement of our church lights with more energy efficient lighting. They did some of our lights in February.

Please see the schedule of Holy Week services and join your church family in walking that difficult journey with Christ to the cross and then rejoicing together in His glorious resurrection!!! Wishing Easter joy to all of you and your families, from your Vestry.

WHO WROTE THAT HYMN? "THE OLD RUGGED CROSS"

George Bennard (02/04/1873-10/10/1958) is the author and composer. This is the story of an old country preacher from Michigan who was almost totally unknown until he wrote the hymn, "The Old Rugged Cross." George Bennard was born in Youngstown, Ohio. His parents, George and Margaret Russell Bennard, were of Scottish descent. George and his five other siblings moved to Albia where his dad ran a tavern. When his father's tavern burned down, his father turned to mining coal. An accident led to his father's death at the age of 49 which forced George, who was just 16, to support his mother and sisters as a coal miner. He grew up under very poor conditions.

In 1895, across the state in Canton, George attended Salvation Army meetings and at the age of 24, he decided to turn to the ministry. He became a minister when he enlisted in the Salvation Army at Rock Island, Illinois and he was then ordained in the Methodist Episcopal Church. By 1898, he was conducting revival meetings throughout the Midwest and later transferred to New York, where he resigned in 1910. At the age of 37, he decided to go out on his own as an evangelist. He preached throughout the United States and Canada. It was during these years that he began composing hymns, and in Albion he started his own hymn publishing company. On writing his hymn, George stated, "I seemed to have a vision....I saw the Christ and the cross inseparable." He wrote the song over a month as he traveled to revival meetings. The melody of the hymn came easily, but he labored over the words in the four verses and the refrain. The hymn was initially published in 1913 and was immediately successful. Of interest is that some folks were known to state that they didn't like the wording, "I will cling to the old rugged cross", as the word cling was found to be bothersome and sounded a bit too Roman Catholic. Some have chosen to sing instead, "I will sing to the old rugged cross".

Although he wrote around 350 hymns, none were as famous as "The Old Rugged Cross." The hymn was first sung formally at a revival meeting at Pokagon, Michigan. Noted evangelist Billy Sunday, an Iowa native, popularized the hymn with his nationally broadcast radio show. By 1939, more than 15 million copies of the hymn had been sold and numerous recordings made.

George's first wife Willaminta died, and in July of 1944 he married Hannah Dahlstrom, his accompanist. Bennard played guitar but not the piano. He was known as a persuasive speaker and a sharp dresser, yet he was known to be a very humble and sincere person. It is said he was a pastor before he was well known but he was never spoiled by the notice he received. "He was as common as an old shoe".

George retired to Reed City and died there at the age of 85 of asthma on 10/10/1958. As of October 9, 1968, near his home, there still stands a twelve-foot-high cross with the words, "The Old Rugged Cross-the home of George Bennard, composer of this beloved hymn". The town also maintains a museum dedicated to his life and ministry.
