DIOCESAN CONVENTION 2015

Diocesan Convention took place at the newly renovated Cathedral in Boston on Saturday, November 14, following the Rededication of the Cathedral and Seating of the Bishop the night before. Both events were well attended with overflow standing at the back and being seated in Sproat Hall on the lower level. In attendance from St. Peter's were The Rev. Sue Lederhouse and Bruce Lederhouse and our Lay Delegates Ken Lihzis and Merry Smythe.

The Friday night event featured the traditional knocking on the door 3 times with his Bishop's crozier by Diocesan Bishop Alan Gates. The Eucharist featured a variety of music provided by several choirs and a number of musicians including an anthem in Chinese. There were remarks of gratitude by all of the groups using the Cathedral. The Rt. Rev. Doug Fisher, Bishop of the Diocese of Western Massachusetts, was the preacher.

On Saturday, the Convention heard a very moving address by Bishop Gates. Check it out on the Diocesan website — www.diomass.org. Three resolutions were offered and approved and there were two changes to the Diocesan Canons and Constitution. The Diocesan budget for 2016 was approved. The only contested election was for Lay member of the Standing Committee. Our former Intern to the Diaconate, Dan Horgan, was appointed to the Commission on Ministry. There was a presentation by the Commission that is studying the Diocesan mission strategy and there will be opportunities to provide feedback to them beginning in January.

The Cathedral itself looks very different now that the pews have been removed and chairs are set up in their place. The walls have been painted a salmon color and the floor is dotted with the tiles for all the parishes in the Diocese – past and present. St. Peter's tile is in the back right side. The front doors are now glass which allows the people outside to look into the Cathedral ("a house for all people"). In addition, there is a very striking Chapel just inside the front door which features an icon given to former Bishop Tom Shaw as a retirement present and a beautiful cross.

ADVENT AT ST. PETER'S

During Advent, we mark the change in season by some changes in our liturgy. Purple is the color for Advent, the color of penitence and of expectation. We use the color purple on every Sunday except the 3rd Sunday of Advent. On that Sunday, "Rejoice Sunday", we use the rose colored vestments and hangings.

During the Advent season, we have no flowers on the altar in keeping with the penitential nature of this season. We will bless the Advent wreath on the First Sunday of Advent (November 29) at both services. Each week we will light a new candle on the Advent wreath (assisted at the 10 a.m. service by parishioners).

During Advent, we make a few changes in our liturgy. At the 8 a.m. service, we will use Eucharistic Prayer I (in the Prayer Book, p. 333). At the 10 a.m. service, we will be using Eucharistic Prayer 2 from *Enriching Our Worship* (pink insert). The choir will again be doing a special introit ("Christ is Coming – Prepare the Way") each Sunday immediately before our opening hymn. For our service music, we will use the Schubert settings of the Kyrie, Sanctus, and Agnus Dei and for a post-communion piece, the Taize chant, "Wait for the Lord." These will be printed as a music insert in the bulletin. At the presentation, we will sing one verse of "Come Thou Long Expected Jesus" (Hymnal #66) as we have done in previous years. It will be printed in the bulletin.

WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY - DECEMBER 14 & 28

The Women's Bible Study has had a very strong beginning. Since its start in September, the women have learned about Herodias, Salome, Hannah, Elizabeth, Hagar, and the Samaritan Woman at the Well. VILLAGE AT CATAUMET

The Village at Cataumet is a family shelter for 18 families. On any given month there are 40-50 people living at the shelter with about half of them being children. At this time of year many arrive with no warm clothing, no money or food stamps. Each family on arrival is given a clean room which has a dorm size refrigerator and microwave. They receive a twin bed with clean bedding and a NEW pillow. Breakfast is provided in the communal kitchen. The families cook their other meals. The kitchen can also be used by families who would like to cook together. Food staples are always needed for new families.

Listed below are their needs at this time:

- 1. NEW pillows
- 2. Twin sheet sets
- 3. Housewares mops & brooms, cleaning supplies
- 4. Food staples
- 5. Children's jackets, hats and mittens
- 6. Adult warm clothes
- 7. Diapers, wipes, sippycups
- 8. Food store certificates, any amount

Donated clothing should only be seasonal as there is not a huge amount of storage. We can still donate our monthly items as most of those things cannot be bought with food stamps
