THE DEACON'S CORNER

"Love hurts, Love scars, Love wounds and mars....."

These words, written by Felice and Boudleaux Bryant, and recorded by the Everly Brothers in 1961, came home to me to with a vengeance this past week when my friend and constant companion of seven years, Buddy, passed away due to kidney failure. My heart and the hearts of everyone in our family have been plowed and harrowed this week.

Buddy was a sad-looking fellow when we found him in March 2011 at the Kingston Animal Pound. He had been found wandering in the woods near there. Neighbors said he had been there for at least 9 months. He was a senior dog and no one seemed to want him. He was terribly underweight and extremely ill with heart worm and Lyme disease. The vet who treated him estimated his age at around seven. There were two shaved patches on his back where medicines had been given to him by infusion.

When I first said hello to him he had such sad eyes. He hung his head and refused to look at me. He was near the point of giving up hope. For me, it was love at first sight! We had started out that day looking for a small, short-haired dog who wouldn't shed. Buddy was large with a glorious reddish-gold coat. Nancy said: "Well, what are we going to do?" I said: "Do? I'm going to get this guy out of here, and take him home with us." So we paid his ransom and he joined our family. We didn't think he'd live very long, but he clearly needed a loving forever home for whatever time he had left. As it turned out, we had seven wonderful years with him.

I was just beginning my studies for the Diaconate and he became my constant companion as I read, studied and wrote in my office. His personality blossomed in our home, but he had a deep fear of being abandoned. We learned to love Buddy.......deeply, fiercely. He could do no wrong in our eyes. In fact, he had no bad habits. He wouldn't get on the furniture or the beds. He didn't bark, but only because he didn't feel the need (I only heard his bark once and he had a deep manly voice). He never threatened another person or dog. He refused to chase the rabbits in our back yard. Buddy liked to take his naps there. I noticed one day that the bunnies were playing, not 6 feet away from him as he slept. At night, before he went to bed, he asked to be let out on the porch, where he would just sit with his head pointed up at the stars, and there he'd sit for 15 or 20 minutes, obviously saying his prayers and communing with his maker. Someone described Buddy as a very old, gentle, and compassionate soul. And he was.....all of that and more.

Buddy taught us to appreciate fresh air, clear skies, our fellow creatures around us, the value of devotion, the comfort of a hug and a nuzzle, patience, the joy of a long walk, and taking time to sniff the grass and flowers.

One day, in the vet's office, a very old female Labrador came tottering in the door. She was very frail and obviously in great pain. Without hesitation, Buddy walked over to her, sidled up to her and touched her muzzle with his own. There was not a dry eye in the place. Buddy always sensed when someone was in pain, suffering. Invariably he would walk over to them, gently touch them or just sit beside them. Isn't that what everyone needs when they are sick? He would have made a perfect therapy dog, but we couldn't bear to live without him while he was in training. I have learned so much from Buddy about how to live gently, compassionately in this world.

Love truly does hurt. If you dare to love anyone, any living thing, you will pay a price. I hope you aren't deterred by that knowledge, because love is also the way to joy, peace, reconciliation, renewal. I learned that from my wife, my daughter, my son-in-law, and from Buddy. It is the way of the Cross.

I love you Buddy. I will probably never meet your like again, but even a short 7 years was enough. We will meet you again, but that seems soooo long to wait.

Thank you all for your patience with Nancy and me as we grieve. Many of you came to know Buddy through my WAVE articles. Is this the last I will write about Buddy? Probably not. He was too central to my life. For those of you who never got to meet Buddy in person, here is a tribute and a picture my son-in-law Carsten posted about him on Facebook. It belongs in this remembrance of Buddy. Thank you all for your thoughts and prayers for us and for Buddy.

VISIBLE VESTRY

Vestry met on Monday, April 16, 2018.

- 1. Bruce Rockwell will be unable to do our audit this year. He has recommended another auditor.
- 2. The 12" numbers for the front of our building have been obtained by Patti Metcalf and installed by Don Smith. Great job!
- 3. Tom Williams who installed our handicapped ramp several years ago has also installed the new handicapped parking signs. We will be restriping the handicapped spaces and the other parking spaces in our parking lot at some point in the future.
- 4. The Vestry approved purchasing a new pump for the downstairs area which will hopefully decrease flooding in the Discovery Preschool. The installation of this pump should take place in May.
- 5. We continue to investigate ways to alleviate problems with our stove.
- 6. We have not heard yet if Mass Maritime Academy (MMA) will be interested in signing another contract with us for cadet parking / plowing. Rev. Sue will follow up with our contact at MMA.
- 7. Holy Week and Easter services went very well and the choir and musicians did a great job! Attendance was higher than last year at most services. Easter attendance was 50 (8:00) and 113 (10:00).
- 8. There will be two baptisms at the 10:00 service on April 29 and 1 baptism at the 10:00 service on Pentecost, May 20. After the baptism on May 20, everyone is invited to a reception at White Cliffs in Plymouth.
- 9. We will be hosting the Diocesan Altar Guild on April 28 which will include a Eucharist and luncheon.
- 10. Deacon Bob and Rev. Sue will be attending the annual Clergy Conference from April 23-25 at Ocean Edge in Brewster. Keynote speaker will be Professor Amy-Jill Levine who authored a book on parables, SHORT STORIES JESUS TELLS, that Rev. Sue used in the parable study we had several years ago.
- 11. Vestry Liaisons from the Administration, Communications, Outreach, Parish Life, and Pastoral Care ministry areas presented their goals for 2018. These were well thought out and substantial goals and we look forward to the work that these groups will do to achieve these goals.
- 12. There was discussion of Parish Hall usage by outside groups. The Building Use form needs to be reviewed and revised. Rev. Sue will send out a copy of the current form to all Vestry members and there will be more discussion at the May Vestry meeting.

LOOKING AHEAD TO PENTECOST - MAY 20

Pentecost is one of those "forgotten" holy days. It doesn't get nearly the same kind of "press" as Christmas or Easter and yet it's an important day when we think about the Church and the formation of Christian community. Like Easter, it's a movable feast. In fact, the date of Pentecost depends on the date of Easter since it falls 50 days later. And since Easter was early this year, so Pentecost is early this year as well. This year, it takes place on **MAY 20.**

One of the great Pentecost traditions is to proclaim the Gospel in many different languages, mirroring that first Pentecost in which people heard the Apostles speaking to them in their own native languages. If YOU can speak another language and would like to help proclaim the Gospel in that language on **Pentecost Sunday, May 20** - at the 8 a.m. or 10 a.m. service, please let me know by **MAY 11**. There will be a signup sheet in the Narthex beginning **April 29**. I will provide the reading for you.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN ENDS MAY 31, 2018

Many thanks to all of you who have been such faithful donors to the St. Peter's Capital Campaign. The Campaign started June 1, 2013 and now will be coming to an end on May 31. Our original goals for the Campaign were: (1) to retire our Stokes Loan (\$20,000) that we took out in 2012 to pay for roof work and new flooring in the Parish Hall and Kitchen; (2) to fund our contribution to the Diocesan Together Now campaign; (3) to increase the Rector's percentage time at St. Peter's; and (4) to create an endowment for future needs. We have done all of these things over the past 5 years and we were also able to use Capital Fund money when we urgently needed to purchase a new freezer two years ago. The remaining funds total over \$67,000. These funds will enable us to pay for unexpected expenses and other capital needs as the Vestry decides.
