VISIBLE VESTRY

The Vestry had their monthly meeting on Monday, December 14, 2015.

- 1. To date we have received 60 pledges. The congregation is encouraged to please turn in pledge cards, as they are important for the Vestry to be able to develop the new 2016 budget.
- 2. Vestry has been very busy working on balancing the 2016 budget for St. Peter's. The Vestry will review the final draft and approve the new budget at their January meeting, so that it can be presented to the congregation.
- 3. Friendly Kitchen had a meeting to determine teams for this coming year to replace Mary Tavares and her crew. A huge thank you to Mary for her 27 years of service to Friendly Kitchen, she will be missed by all on Monday nights. See separate article in this WAVE.

- 4. We had a new router installed on the office computer, which has greatly improved the connectivity and the speed of the computer.
- 5. A much needed new vacuum cleaner has finally been purchased, and we thank 2 donors for their generous contribution of \$200 toward its purchase.
- 6. Ralph Perry did our annual fire extinguisher inspection, and also the semi-annual range hood inspection in the kitchen. Both passed with no additional expense.
- 7. We are considering possibly adding an electrical heating strip near the conference table in the meeting room to help improve the heat during the winter. It gets quite cold in there and makes it difficult to have Bible Study and other meetings in that room in the colder weather months. Right now we have an approximate cost of \$700 to add the heating strip.
- 8. The Nominating Committee had their meeting and the nominees are listed under a separate article in this WAVE.
- 9. We have two new chalice bearers and 2 new readers. See separate article in this WAVE.
- 10. Vestry voted on the recipients of our annual Outreach Giving donations for 2015. Amazing Grace Camp, Housing Assistance Corporation (designated specifically for the Village at Cataumet), The Cape Cod Times Needy Fund and Episcopal Relief and Development Fund, were approved.
- 11. There is no definite return date for John Platanitis at this time. Bruce Lederhouse will continue as Interim Music Director/Organist. Lisa Platanitis will continue to assist Bruce. Thank you to both for their service to our church and choir.

PANCAKE BREAKFAST

EPIPHANY AT ST. PETER'S

The season of Epiphany is one that varies in length depending on the date of Easter. This year we have a VERY short season of Epiphany. It starts on January 6 and ends with Shrove Tuesday which this year will be February 9. The color for the Epiphany season is white through the First Sunday after Epiphany (January 10) in which we celebrate the Baptism of Christ. Then it switches to green, the color of mission and growth until the Last Sunday after Epiphany when the color is white once more.

During Epiphany, we make a few changes in our liturgy. At the 8:00 service, we will return to Eucharistic Prayer II (p. 340). At the 10:00 service, we will be using Eucharistic Prayer B (beginning on p. 367). For our service music, we will use the Rutter "Glory to You, Lord God of Our Fathers" (Hymnal S-236) as our Song of Praise; "In Your Church, Lord, Be Glorified" for the Presentation; "Santo, Santo, Santo" (an Argentine folk song) for the Sanctus; "Now the Silence" for the Fraction Anthem and "The Lord is My Light and My Salvation" for the Post-Communion Hymn. Most of these will be on an insert in the bulletin. At both services, we will return to the form of the Prayers of the People (written by the Rev. Steve White) that we have been using throughout most of the year. These will be on green inserts in the bulletin.

WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY - JANUARY 11 & 25

On January 11, we will look at **Delilah** (NO – not the Tom Jones version!). On January 25, we will study **Lydia**, the famed "dealer in purple" from Acts. No previous Bible knowledge is required. A Bible is helpful but if you don't have one, we can provide one for you. **The group normally meets on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of each month at 12:30 p.m.** All women of the parish are invited. Bring a bag lunch and there will be coffee/tea and goodies provided.

At the Friendly Kitchen meeting on December 13, Marie Whitcomb and Diane Simski who serve as the coordinators of one of the other teams, volunteered a solution. They said that they would continue to coordinate their regular team BUT they would also be happy to cook for another Monday each month if others could be enlisted to serve the meal and clean up. That would allow us to continue to have 3 regular teams (Marie and Diane, The Taylor Family, and the new M/D 2 team) as well as the St. Margaret's team which prepares meals on holiday Mondays. This seemed like a good solution to our current situation.

The service for our children gone too soon was very moving and comforting at the same time. We know and trust that God is love and the souls of our precious ones are in His care. Although we miss them more than words can express, we try to be thankful for the time we had with them, and are determined that they will never be forgotten. We all now live altered lives, we strive to be more compassionate, understanding, loving, and forgiving. We are resolved to try our very best to help others, especially the newly bereaved, survive the shock and horror of such an unimaginable loss. Oddly we have become 'family' in the midst of our grief. St. Peter's support of our mission is such a wonderful blessing we just can't thank you all enough!"

VILLAGE AT CATAUMET

The Village at Cataumet is a family shelter for 18 families. On any given month there are 40-50 people living at the shelter with about half of them being children. At this time of year many arrive with no warm clothing, no money or food stamps. Each family on arrival is given a clean room which has a dorm size refrigerator and microwave. They receive a twin bed with clean bedding and a NEW pillow. Breakfast is provided in the communal kitchen. The families cook their other meals. The kitchen can also be used by families who would like to cook together. Food staples are always needed for new families.

Listed below are their needs at this time:

- 1. NEW pillows
- 2. Twin sheet sets
- 3. Housewares mops & brooms, cleaning supplies
- 4. Food staples
- 5. Children's jackets, hats and mittens
- 6. Adult warm clothes
- 7. Diapers, wipes, sippy-cups
- 8. Food store certificates, any amount

Donated clothing should only be seasonal as there is not a huge amount of storage. We can still donate our monthly items as most of those things cannot be bought with food stamps.
