#### THE SEASON OF LONG GREEN

And so we have arrived at that time. We're past all the celebrations of Christmas and Epiphany and the somber season of Lent and the emotional time of Holy Week leading to the joy of the Easter Season and the outpouring of the Spirit on Pentecost. We've passed the confusing mystery of Trinity Sunday and we're into "Long Green" – that seemingly endless season after Pentecost. This year the "Long Green" season really is LONG – very LONG – very GREEN! Because Easter was almost as early as it possibly can be, the season after Pentecost is just about as long as it can be. With just a few exceptions once we get into November and celebrate All Saints Sunday and Christ the King Sunday, from now until November 27, you will see green on the altar and green vestments on Deacon Bob and me. An endless sea of green.

But green is good.

Green has come to be the symbol for saving this planet Earth and we are trying to do that in a variety of ways at St. Peter's. Through our Capital Campaign fund, we have just purchased a more energy efficient refrigerator to replace the 20+ year old one that stopped working on Pentecost (despite the outpouring of the Spirit!) Through Diocesan Green Grants, we have been able to replace several doors and toilets as well as add a dishwasher and an on demand water heater. Our disposal contract with Cavossa allows us to recycle a variety of items as well. We now have energy efficient thermostats in most of the spaces in our church complex. And hopefully our Diocesan Congregational Development Grant will be approved and we will be able to purchase a more energy efficient stove.

Green also symbolizes growth and green symbolizes mission. Green means GO when we see it on a traffic light and green means GO when we see it Sunday by Sunday. Go and tell. Go and serve. Go and be God's people in the world. Go do the things that God has called each one of us to do. Go and be that one person that someone needs to meet – that someone needs to talk to. Go and tell the story. Go and be the living Gospel – the living Good News - to a world that so desperately needs it.

GO GREEN!

#### THE DEACON'S CORNER

June is the beginning of summer here on the Cape. Even though we're told by merchants that summer doesn't officially start until July 4th weekend, we know different.

June .... fairly bursting with life, when the rhododendrons put out their softball-sized flowers, the ocean turns that beautiful shade of blue, the grass fairly jumps out of the ground in the front yard, our summer friends return, and we begin to venture out, after a long New England winter's hibernation, to get back in touch with the world.

It's also what Clergy call "Ordinary Time," or "The Long Green." We'll wear our green vestments for the next six months. Ordinary Time refers to the period of the Church's liturgical year that falls outside of the major seasons (Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter). In an article entitled "What Does Ordinary Time Mean?" Scott Richert explains:

"Ordinary Time is called 'ordinary' because the weeks are numbered. The Latin word *ordinalis*, which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word *ordo*, from which we get the English word order. Thus, Ordinary Time is in fact the ordered life of the Church—the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) or in more severe penance (as in Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ."

So, watch and pray, and enjoy the beautiful month of June!

The Vestry held their monthly meeting on Monday, May 16, 2016.

- 1. Our May check from Waddle Books was for \$133.76
- 2. The Friends of the Cotuit Library are inviting us to take their leftover books after their Book Sale on July 9. Priscilla Ellis has volunteered to pick up the books on Saturday and bring them to church on the next day. Thank you to Priscilla, this is a huge help, as it saves someone from crossing the Bridge and returning on a high traffic July weekend.
- **3.** The Congregational Development Grant has been completed and submitted on May 16. We very much need your prayers that we will be awarded this grant which is needed to replace our old worn out kitchen stove. Our current stove has served us and Friendly Kitchen faithfully for an amazing 40 years.
- **4.** Rev. Sue, Lynne Brune and Henri Masson are in the process of having discussions with solar companies. Their first informational meeting is May 19 with one of several companies being considered. Information received from their meeting will be presented to Vestry next month.
- **5.** There will be two baptisms on Sunday June 5. One at the 8:00 (the grandchild of Moe and Sally Gosselin) and one at the 10:00 service (The child of Amber Berio).

- **6.** Rev. Sue and the Wardens will attend their second Diocesan Small Church Meeting on May 22 in Quincy.
- 7. Some of the Amazing Grace Camp leaders will attend both of our June 12th, 8:00 and 10:00 a.m., church services to talk about this year's Camp and how we can be involved in supporting this wonderful outreach activity.
- **8.** We are hoping to welcome back Bruce Lederhouse to our 10:00 service as organist on May 29. There is no further update on John Platanitis, at this time. Again, we express our sincere thank you to Lisa Platanitis for her amazing music ministry that has kept us afloat during these past difficult weeks.
- **9.** On June 26, July 3 and July 24, we are pleased to welcome a substitute organist, Tom Nordquist, a member of Christ Church/ Plymouth. Father Ken Campbell will be our supply priest for June 26 and July 3.
- **10.** Our Fire Alarm Box and system have now been installed and brought up to current codes. Thank you to Henri Masson for all the hours spent at the church overseeing this multi-day project with the installer and the new Bourne Fire Chief.
- **11.** We have been receiving ongoing donations for our yard sale and our November Holiday Fair. As you are spring cleaning out your home, please remember us, and feel free to leave your donations at the church on any Monday, Friday or Sunday.
- **12.** Saturday, May 21 will be our annual clean up the yard day from 9:00 to 3:00. You don't need to stay for the entire time but any help is appreciated. Many hands have made for very light work in the past, thus requiring only about 3 hours of total trimming and weeding time.
- **13.** Pentecost Sunday we were blessed with a total attendance of 140 folks!! In addition, our church ladies had a wonderful time of fellowship the next day at the annual spring luncheon at Lindsey's Restaurant. A record number of 24 ladies attended!!
- 14. Vestry approved a cap of \$4,000.00 to replace our kitchen refrigerator (See Separate Article).
- **15.** Vestry approved the following Fund Raising Event dates for this year.

As these dates approach there will be sign-up sheets for volunteer help that will be needed.

- a) July 4, Craft vendors will be using our lawn for their sales. The cost is \$50 per table and will not require any extra work from our church.
- b) September 3, we will have our Fall Fair.
- c) October 2, we will have our Yard Sale in conjunction with the Blessing of the Animals.
- d) November 5, we will have our Holiday Fair.
- e) September 11, we will have our Parish Picnic at Ursula Cinelli's house. If it rains we will have it at the church.
- **16.** Deacon Bob attended the annual Clergy Conference with Rev. Sue. He also reported that the Bible Study sessions at Mass. Maritime are completed for this year, as students are now taking final exams to end the school year.
- 17. The next Vestry meeting will be a week earlier than usual on June 13.

#### YOUR CAPITAL CAMPAIGN DOLLARS AT WORK!!!

Pentecost Sunday was a fabulous day and thankfully ended on a very high note, however, the day did not start off that way. You may have heard by now that as parishioners arrived at church on Sunday morning, it was discovered that our refrigerator had lost its cooling capacity. A wonderful and expensive pork roast that was supposed to be used for the Friendly Kitchen meal on Monday had to be discarded, along with other perishables.

Henri Masson contacted a number of companies to see if we could get a repair man to assess the problem. New England Refrigeration from Wareham was quick to respond to our needs. The outcome of their service call was that it would cost us close to \$900 to fix the problem. Upon hearing this, Henri then contacted Highland Restaurant Supply Company to see what it would cost to replace the refrigerator. The cost was \$3,325.00, which included removal of the existing appliance. Since the part was difficult to get for a 20+ year old refrigerator, it would take over a week or perhaps longer to repair.

Vestry assessed the situation, and the practical decision was made to approve the purchase of a new refrigerator. The cost of this will be taken from the Capital Campaign Fund, which you all have so generously been donating to these past 3 years. We are so thankful for this emergency fund for capital expenses that sometimes come up suddenly and without warning. Your Capital Campaign dollars saved the day and will make a significant improvement in updating our kitchen with a newer more energy efficient refrigerator. Thank you, parishioners!!!!!

## AMAZING GRACE CAMP PRESENTATION - JUNE 12

On June 12, we will have the opportunity at both services to hear some more about the Amazing Grace Camp plans for this summer. The Rev. Carol Bolstad, Vice-President of the Board of Directors at Amazing Grace, will return to speak with us again.

Amazing Grace Camp is for children who currently have, or have had, a parent incarcerated. The camp experience demonstrates unconditional love, with the intention of breaking the chain of intergenerational incarceration. These children often suffer emotional trauma and are ostracized by peers and peer families. This leads to shame, low self-esteem, low trust and a greater risk of incarceration themselves.

This year the camp will run from **August 21 to August 26 at Camp Burgess in Sandwich.** Last year, six parishioners from St. Peter's (Jack and Nancy Kennedy, Karen McGuinness, and Deacon Bob and Nancy Sherwood) were actively involved as volunteers at the Camp. Amazing Grace can always use more volunteers and more financial support. Pray about how you might be able to help!

## WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY - JUNE 13

On **JUNE 13**, we will be studying the woman in the Song of Solomon (also known as the Song of Songs) from the Old Testament. **This will be the LAST WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY until the FALL. #### HELPING IN HAITI

I was fortunate enough to experience Haiti with a group of Britsionarys (what BeLikeBrit calls those who visit the orphanage) through a non-profit organization called BeLikeBrit (BLB). The organization was founded by Len and CherylAnn Gengel, the parents of Britney Gengel, a 19-year-old who was killed in the 2010 devastating earthquake in Haiti while volunteering with a group. In her last communication with her parents, she expressed her wish to move to Haiti and start an orphanage, and in her honor, they did just that. The orphanage is home to 66 children and has created employment for 100 Haitians.

The orphanage was our home for the week we were there. Most mornings started by watching the spectacular sunrises up on the rooftop. After breakfast, our mornings would be spent at the work site building homes for those in need. The people in need reach out to BLB for help, then BLB prioritizes the housing needs and we had the honor of building a home for Madame Saint Rosa. We would then return to the orphanage for lunch and then go off on excursions, sometimes up the mountains for hiking and observing breathtaking views of Haiti. Other excursions included a trip to the beach, the marketplace, and some voodoo temples. Before and after dinner, we spent quality time with the children playing volleyball, singing, dancing, reading books and just talking to them, as they are all doing so well learning English at the orphanage. Our evenings would end on the rooftop as a group for reflections sharing our highs and lows of the day.

In such a poverty-stricken country, the people of Haiti love what they have and they work so hard to get nowhere, yet they are all so appreciative and happy. Haiti is such a beautiful country, but yet the people are living in such poor conditions.

The goal of the organization is to have the orphanage self-sustaining, right now they have their own water filtration system, they have solar power and a generator to assist with the electricity, and they have 100 plants and trees for food supply. It is home to 66 beautiful children living and thriving in an earthquake-proof orphanage in Grand Goave, raising the next generation of leaders in Haiti.

BeLikeBrit is always in need of donations of all kinds; they have a list of items needed and they are always needing funding for education as well as keeping the orphanage running, or you can be a Britsionary as well.
